


Construction progress continues on First Step Shelter

P&S Paving begins 5-year borrow pit excavation project

With hot, but mostly dry weather, APM Construction crews and their subcontractors have stayed on schedule. The roof for the entire structure is complete, and windows have been installed on the upper level. Interior electrical, air conditioning, plumbing and metal framing for drywall partitions is underway. Site lighting for the parking lot area is being done by FP&L.

This week P&S Paving began stabilizing a one-mile access road, which runs east of the First Step Shelter building and leads to their multi-year excavation project in partnership with the city. They are expected to start excavating the first 40-acre borrow pit near the I-4 roadway next week.



Fire Department welcomes new recruits

The Daytona Beach Fire Department welcomed six new rookies on February 1 — Matthew Roos, Donald Franette, Alicia Shepard, Casey Manfredi, Jake Pequignot and Micah McCarthy.

As newly hired firefighters, they will be on probation for their first year, which is considered vital in transforming rookies into experienced firefighters. Recruits will work under the tutelage of an experienced

lieutenant who will mentor and continually provide additional firefighting training. Recruits will undergo frequent testing on their firefighting and medical skills to evaluate their knowledge and performance.

According to officials, the six rookies excelled in their initial training and will be attending paramedic school next, which is an intense year-and-a-half of advanced emergency medical training. As paramedics, they will contribute to the department's efforts to provide quality EMS care to the residents and visitors of Daytona Beach.



Enclosed dumpsters inspected citywide

Recently all of the commercial dumpsters in the city were physically inspected for compliance with the city's Code of Ordinances, which requires all front load dumpsters visible from the street and in the general public to be contained with an enclosure. Throughout the city, there are almost 200 enclosures. Each dumpster was given a grade from A to D, with A being in compliance and D being non-compliant because there was no associated enclosure.

Results of the field inspection:

- ◆ GRADE A — 90 locations
- ◆ GRADE B — 21 locations requiring minor repairs
- ◆ GRADE C — 11 locations requiring major repairs
- ◆ GRADE D — 56 locations without the required enclosure

*19 were not accessible due to locked gates.

As a result of the findings, the city's code enforcement department will begin the process of bringing the commercial properties' dumpsters and their enclosures into compliance.

South Beach Street force main project update


Investing in our infrastructure

The city will soon advertise for a contractor to build a new 36-inch sanitary sewer line in the South Beach Street area. The project, with an estimated cost of \$7.5 million, begins at the Live Oak and Palmetto intersection and then continues along South Beach Street to the Bethune Wastewater Treatment Facility. It is expected to begin this fall and take about 18 months to complete. This project will be built in conjunction with the construction of two new segments of the Sweetheart Trail along South Beach Street from Bellevue to Orange avenues.

Once finished, the new force main project will increase system reliability and provide capacity for future growth in the downtown area.

Funded with FDEP's State Revolving Funds, the new force main will also mitigate the potential for sanitary sewer overflows in the existing gravity main on Palmetto Avenue.

Once bids are received and a contractor is selected, an agenda item will be prepared for City Commission consideration.
