Beach Street Streetscape starts south from Bay Street

Work on the roadway heading north from Orange Avenue almost complete



The Beach Street Streetscape project made a monumental move into phase four last week, which involves work on the west side of Beach Street from Bay Street to International Speedway Boulevard (ISB). Crews are in the process of clearing this stretch and will be removing the existing curb, gutter, sidewalk and vegetation as well as repainting the arches. To minimize storefront impact, crews are completing work one section at a time along the block.

Businesses remain open and parking is available behind the stores and can be accessed from Bay Street and Palmetto Avenue. The work will not disrupt pedestrian traffic into the stores, and crews are working with shop owners to minimize disruption during business hours.

Other project highlights include:

- Palm trees were planted on the east side of Beach Street from Orange Avenue and Bay Street.
- Decorative sidewalk has been installed along the entire stretch on the eastside of the project.
- 95% of the storefront water meters between Orange Avenue to Bay Street have been replaced.
- Street lights are functional on the east side from Orange Avenue to ISB.
- Parking is available on the east side from Orange Avenue to Bay Street.

Public meeting July 21 for potable water tank and pump station project

There will be a neighborhood meeting for the Heineman Street Potable Water Tank and Pump Station Project beginning at 6 p.m. **Tuesday, July 21**, at Suburbia Park, 700 Heineman St.

This project involves the construction of a five-million gallon, pre-stressed concrete, potable water ground storage tank and high service pump station at 700 Heineman Street that will improve water quality, pressure and fire flow in the surrounding area.

This site was previously used for an elevated storage tank, which has since been removed.



The proposed project site includes construction of a new tank, pump station building and generator in the field on the western portion of the site to accommodate the continued use of the eastern portion as a park.

Construction is expected to start in mid-2021 and will take about a year to complete.

New traffic signal being installed in front of Mainland High School

A new Pedestrian Hybrid Beacon traffic signal is in the process of being installed by the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) on International Speedway Boulevard (ISB) in front of Mainland High School. The installation of this signal comes after FDOT completed a pedestrian safety study of ISB between Clyde Morris Boulevard and White Street and found that this area was in need of pedestrian safety improvements. This type of signal has been successfully used across the U.S. to improve pedestrian safety.

CARE Update: Building permit fees

Last week, the waiving of commercial and residential permit fees ended after being available for 90 days. The waiving of the permit fees was part of the city's COVID-19 Assistance



Recovery program, also known as CARE, that Commissioners approved March 24.

In the 90-day period that building permit fees were waived, a total of 1,771 permits were issued for a total valuation of \$136,785,216. The amount of fees waived was \$808,045. The waiving of the

permit fees did not impact fee payments and did not waive the need to apply for a permit.

Health department offers face masks

Rental assistance remains available

Funding is still available for Daytona Beach residents needing financial assistance with their monthly rent payments.

There is about \$206,500 remaining for disbursement in the popular program. In the first seven weeks since introducing the city's rental assistance program, 324 households were assisted representing a total assistance awarded of \$411,939. The average rental payment is \$899.



The rental assistance program is intended to provide financial relief to residents impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Appointments must be made to submit completed applications and provide documentation. Appointments can be made by calling Central Florida Community Development Corporation at (386) 226-1216 or Mid-Florida Housing Partnership Corporation at (386) 274-4441, ext. 301 and 304.

PPE available for local businesses

Local businesses can pick up free Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) and cleaning supplies at the Daytona Regional Chamber of Commerce from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Tuesday, July 7. PPE kits will include masks, gloves, sanitizer, paper towels and cleaning products. Up to two kits per business can be obtained upon request. Business must provide a business card indicating they are from a Volusia County business and sign that they received the products.

The PPE kits are being made available to local businesses through a partnership of the Volusia County Chamber Alliance partners and Volusia County Government who has allocated \$1 million in CARES Act funds to purchase the supplies. The Daytona Regional Chamber of Commerce is located at 126 E. Orange Ave. in Daytona Beach.

Mortgage assistance

Volusia County's Community Assistance Division is accepting applications from homeowners who have been financially impacted by COVID-19. The program includes assistance for eligible households for payment of late, current and, if they remain eligible, future payments. For more information, visit www.volusia.org/coronavirus.



Business assistance

The County of Volusia is allocating up to \$10 million in emergency relief to support local businesses with a commercial presence within the County who have been negatively impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. Qualifying businesses may be eligible to receive a one-time reopening grant. Businesses that have 25 employees or less may be eligible to receive \$3,000 or businesses that have between 26 and 50 employees may be eligible for \$5,000. Votran begins service to Tanger Outlets and Tomoka Town Center

Votran passengers now have a dedicated stop at Tanger Outlets and Tomoka Town Center. Votran has split its current Route 11 into two routes, 11A and 11B. While 11A will continue to service the traditional route to the Daytona Beach Flea Market, 11B will travel to the Tanger Outlet/Tomoka Town Center area.

Destinations on are on a one-hour service schedule. Overlapping areas (those that are served by both A and B) will continue to be served every 30 minutes. Night service will begin when regular retail hours resume.

Riders may access the Tanger Outlets/Tomoka Town Center area on Sundays via Route 10S, which will service the stop every hour, outbound only, from 7 a.m. to 5 p.m. Riders may learn more by visiting votran.org. The website provides up-to-date alerts and real-time bus tracking. It also offers downloadable information for the myStop mobile app for real-time bus information anywhere.
