Farmers' Market relocates

At the end of August, the Downtown Farmers' Market relocated to a new home on Magnolia Avenue between Beach Street and Palmetto Avenue. The market has a new name, Market at Magnolia, and is open from 7 a.m. to noon every Saturday. Parking is available behind Beach Street businesses and can be accessed from the side streets and Palmetto Avenue. Patrons must stay six feet away from others, point at items to purchase (cannot touch), wear masks and disposable gloves. 


Beach Street Streetscape on schedule

The block north of International Speedway Boulevard (ISB) completely reopened with wider sidewalks, new pavers, lighting and landscaping, and more parking on both sides of the Beach Street. The city has added more than 30 new public parking spaces on Myrtle Alley, located behind the shops between Magnolia Avenue and ISB as part of the project. Pier fishing section reopens

The popular fishing section on the eastern end of the Daytona Beach Pier has reopened after undergoing repairs to its damaged substructure caused by Hurricane Dorian and rough seas earlier this year. The pier is open from dawn to dusk, seven days a week. There is no cost and fishing licenses are not required.





Be on the lookout for Census takers

Census takers are visiting homes that haven't responded to the census. You can make sure you are counted by responding in one of three ways:

- Go to www.my2020census.gov.
- Call (844) 330-2020.
- Complete and return the paper form.

Census takers are hired locally, wear face masks and follow COVID-19 social distancing and other health protocols. They will never ask to enter your home and will not ask for money. Make sure they have an ID badge with their photograph, a U.S. Department of Commerce watermark and an expiration date. Census workers may also carry a bag with the Census Bureau logo. If you have questions about their identity, call (800) 923-8282 to speak with a Census Bureau representative.



Face coverings required

The requirement for people working, living, visiting or doing business in the city to wear a face covering in any indoor location, other than a home or residence, when social distancing is not possible remains in effect. There are exceptions to the face covering requirement. Free face masks are available at several locations throughout the city. Rental assistance available

The city has extended its rental assistance program for income-eligible residents affected by the pandemic. The city has received \$220,837 in Coronavirus Relief Funds as part of the federal Coronavirus Aid Relief and Economic Security Act for the program. Applications will be accepted until the funds have been depleted or through Dec. 15, 2020. Assistance is provided on a first-complete application and first qualified/eligible basis.
