It's not too late to complete the 2020 Census

The U.S. Census Bureau has extended its deadline to October. If you have not already completed the census, there is a good chance someone will be knocking on your door beginning Aug. 11 to make sure you are counted.

You can make sure you are counted and respond to the census in three ways:

- Go to www.my2020census.gov
- Call (844) 330-2020
- Complete and return the paper form

It will only take about 10 minutes, and you don't need a code to respond online or by phone. Make sure you include everyone in your household, including children and roommates.

The census counts our population and households, providing the basis for reapportioning congressional seats, redistricting, and distributing more than \$675 billion in federal funds annually to support states, counties and communities. These funds affect vital programs – including housing, education, transportation, employment, health care and public policy. Please do your part to help the city reach a 100% response rate. Daytona Beach requires face coverings when indoors

Free masks are available at locations throughout the city

To help prevent the spread of COVID-19, people working, living, visiting or doing business in the City of Daytona Beach are required to wear a face covering in any indoor location, other than a home or residence, when social distancing is not possible. 


Mayor Derrick Henry launches Equity Initiative

Docks and fishing pier open at Bethune Point Park

Boaters and anglers can enjoy a new access ramp and repaired fishing pier at the city-owned Bethune Point Park, which is off South Beach Street along the Halifax River. Bethune Point Park, 11 Bellevue Ave. in Daytona Beach, is open daily from dawn to dusk. Restrooms have reopened; however, picnic tables under the pavilion and the skateboard park remain closed. Due to COVID-19, the city has suspended facility rentals until further notice. The park offers plenty of trailer parking. Those headed south down the intracoastal waterway can quickly get up to speed since the park is near the southern limit of the no-wake zone.



Stay cool at the city's pools

Get a break from the heat by taking a swim at the Campbell Aquatic Center, 400 Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd., or the Cypress Aquatic Center, 981 George W. Engram Blvd. Visitors will have their temperature checked before being allowed into each facility and should adhere to social distancing guidelines, including being six feet apart. People who are sick, coughing or do not feel well should not enter. Groups are restricted to 10 or less people.

Cypress Aquatic Center is limited to 50 people occupancy and Campbell Aquatic Center is limited to 25 people occupancy. Bathrooms are open at both facilities, but loitering is not allowed. For more details, including the pool hours, visit www.codb.us.
