



Learn-to-swim lessons available

Registration is open for learn-to-swim lessons at the city's Cypress Aquatic Center located 981 George W. Engram Blvd.

The lessons are for youth ages 4 to 10, as well as adults. There are multiple swimming skill levels to choose from according to person's capability. Classes are based on age and skill level. The 30-minute classes are offered two times per week (Monday and Wednesday or Tuesday and Thursday), totaling eight classes per session.

- Session 1 lessons are from April 5 through April 29.
- Session 2 lessons are from May 3 through May 27.

The history of the Daytona Beach Fire Department is featured in an exhibit at the Halifax Historical Museum. Now through the summer, guests can view the exhibit with memorabilia and equipment highlighting the department's history dating back to the late 1800s through modern day. The museum is located at 252 S. Beach St. and is open Tuesday through Friday from 10:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. and Saturday from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Museum admission is \$7 for adults and \$1 for children 12 and under. Thursday admission is by donation, and children under 12 can visit the museum for free on Saturday.
