Upgraded amenities planned for Daisy Stocking Park

Daytona Beach Racing & Recreational Facilities District provides grant

A \$330,000 grant will help fund new and upgraded amenities at Daisy Stocking Park, a four-acre neighborhood park near Bethune-Cookman University. The grant award was announced by the Daytona Beach Racing and Recreational Facilities District at their board meeting last month. Planned improvements include adding a new children's playground, shading and upgraded seating for the existing outdoor amphitheater, a walking trail with fitness stations, a family pavilion with barbecue grills, new sidewalks and landscaping.



Upgrades are planned for the outdoor amphitheater at Daisy Stocking Park located at 550 Dr. Mary McLeod Bethune Blvd.

the popular Midtown Music Concert Series to the park and hosted its first Game Night there in September.

The park is a destination on the city's Black Heritage Trail and was named after Daisy Hardy Stocking, one of the city's foremost humanitarians and medical practitioners.

Annually about 3,000 people attend one of the many community events at Daisy Stocking Park, which is open to the public year round. Last summer the city moved

Stocking came to Daytona in 1916 at the behest of fellow South Carolinian and Scotia Seminary alumni Mary McLeod Bethune. Having trained as a registered nurse, Stocking supervised McLeod Hospital on the campus of Daytona Normal and Industrial Institute (now Bethune-Cookman University) from 1916 to 1918. In 1971, three years after her death, the park was established by the Daytona Beach City Commission.

Police Department transitioning crime reports to new, more detailed system

Like all law enforcement agencies in Florida, the Daytona Beach Police Department is transitioning to a new crime reporting system, which will provide more accurate, detailed and transparent data about the various types of crimes happening in the community. The conversion to the National Incident-Based Reporting System (NIBRS or FIBRS, Florida’s version of the system) is part of a major initiative nationwide to improve crime data collection and provide consistency in reporting across agencies. The Florida Department of Law Enforcement will oversee the collection of FIBRS crime data.

What are the differences between the outgoing UCR system and NIBRS?

Prior to this year, the Police Department used the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) system to collect and report crime data. The key difference between the UCR system and NIBRS is that UCR only counts the most serious crime of a particular incident, while NIBRS counts ALL crimes committed during an incident. For example, using the UCR system, if someone is murdered during a robbery, only the murder stat is documented. With NIBRS, both crimes are recorded. NIBRS captures details on each single crime incident – as well as on separate offenses within the same incident. This includes information on victims, known offenders, relationships between victims and offenders, arrestees and stolen or recovered property involved in crimes.

Due to this change in reporting, crime statistics will initially appear to increase; however, this does NOT mean the crime rate is rising.

Another difference is the frequency of submitting information – UCR information was reported twice a year, while NIBRS is submitted monthly.

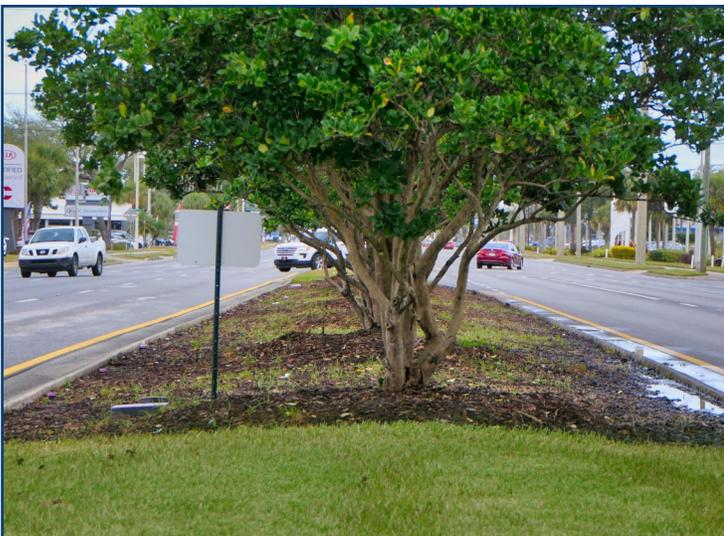
Initiative encourages investment in city's core area

In the nearly four months since waiving building permit and inspection fees for improvements made in the core area of the city, 84 permits have been issued representing a whopping 600% increase over the same time period in the previous year when only 12 permits were issued.

Roof replacements, upgraded electrical and fire suppression systems and new fences, doors, windows and air conditioning are some examples of the investment being made by residential and commercial property owners in the area bordered by Mason Avenue to Shady Place and Ridgewood Avenue to Nova Road.

The suspension of fees was approved by city commissioners for a two-year period from Oct. 2021 to Oct. 2023.

New redistricting webpage launched

An informational and interactive [webpage](#) created to explain the city's redistricting process, timeline, requirements and population statistics has been linked to the city's homepage. The newly created page also includes a brief survey designed to gather residents' feedback on possible "communities of interest" that should be considered in the redistricting process and asks about preferences for public review.

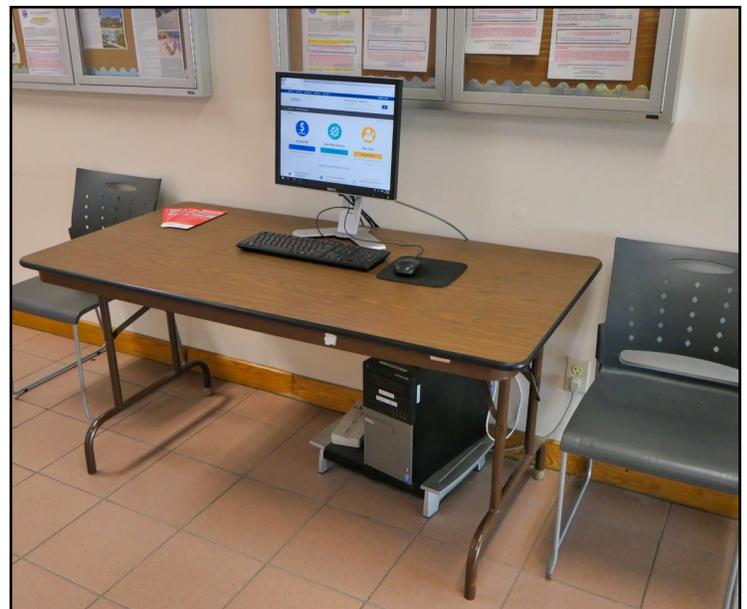


What is a "community of interest?"

A community of interest is a geographically connected population that shares common social and economic interests such as major neighborhoods, college and university campuses, active HOAs, Community Redevelopment Areas or geographically compact or contiguous populations of minorities and ethnic backgrounds. City expands payment options

Last month, a new internal process was put in place to receive credit card and checks payments in the Permits and Licensing, Business Tax Receipts and Code Enforcement offices making it easier and more efficient for customers to pay fees. Prior to the workflow change, payments were only accepted by the Utility Billing department, which required customers to visit multiple offices to complete a transaction. Now there are payment "stations" in the main hallway at City Hall and Permits and Licensing, Business Tax Receipts and Code Enforcement offices.

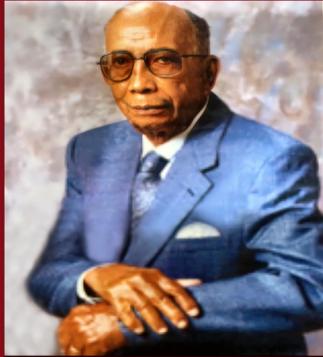
The city partnered with the Midtown Community Development Corporation again this year to recognize the 16 local Black leaders.
