


## Colin's Park reopens

When residents visit Colin's Park on the beachside, they'll be greeted with upgraded playground equipment, new connecting sidewalks and dog park and refreshed landscaping. The \$167,625 improvement project was funded in part by a \$53,125 grant from the Daytona Beach Racing and Recreational Facilities District. Colin's Park opened in 1996 and is at 100 University Blvd. The 2.5 acre park also has picnic tables, grills, benches, restrooms and a fishing dock/pier. Park hours are 8 a.m. to 7 p.m. April through November and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. December through March.

## Dickerson Community Center & Campbell Aquatic Pool reopen

Join us for a grand reopening community event from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 5, to celebrate the completion of a three-year project to improve amenities and functionality at the Dickerson Community Center, 308 S. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd., and adjacent Campbell Aquatic Center.

Improvements include new playground equipment, basketball court, additional parking, connecting sidewalks in the reconfigured space, improved exterior lighting, exterior paint and upgraded landscaping as well as new flooring in the gymnasium. The entrance to Campbell Aquatic Center was moved to the north side with a new pool entry pavilion, stairs and ADA compliant ramp to enter the area and two canopy shade structures over picnic tables.

The almost \$1.7 million project received about \$369,000 in grants from the Daytona Beach Racing and Recreational Facilities District. At the reopening celebration, residents can enjoy free swimming, games, music and refreshments.



## Police urge car owners to install free software upgrade to prevent theft

Reports of stolen cars in Daytona Beach rose last year due in part to a nationwide theft epidemic ignited by social media challenges targeting certain Hyundai and Kia models. Daytona Beach police are asking Hyundai and Kia owners to have free software installed that updates their vehicle's theft alarm system.
