New software unveiled to streamline permitting process

Platform makes it simple to search permits and development projects

The City of Daytona Beach is using a new online permitting software system, called Intuitive Municipal Solutions (iMS), which streamlines the process for issuing building permits and improves access to stored data for individual properties and large-scale development projects.

Replacing the software TRAKit from CentralSquare, the web-based system makes it easier for residents to search city records including building permits, code compliance cases, land development applications, Business Tax Receipts and rental property licenses. More than 15 years of historical information from TRAKit was integrated into iMS. The process to transfer more than a million records took city staff 12 months, and staff training on the new system occurred earlier this month.

To access the iMS platform, visit www.CODB.us/iMS. New users can create an account or continue as a guest.

For additional help on setting up a new account, instructional videos are posted on the city's website.

Users of the new iMS system are able to:

- Access through a laptop, tablet or smartphone
- Apply for or renew Business Tax Receipts and rental property licenses
- By using a map view, select a parcel and automatically see all its associated records
- Pay permit, license or code compliance fees or fines online
- Request inspections
- Search by parcel number, address, application date, owner or project name, permit or case number
- Search code violations and case information including photos
- Submit building permit or development review applications
- View the status of development projects






Homepage allows users to quickly navigate a variety of information and services. The platform is accessible on a computer, tablet or smartphone.

Parks & Rec team attend trailer towing safety training

Employee safety training is vital for preventing accidents, boosting morale and productivity, reducing costs and continuing employees' education. It is an investment that not only protects employees but also contributes to the overall success of this organization. Recently, Safety Officer Kirk Bullock organized a class about trailer towing for employees in the Public Works and Parks & Recreation departments. Following a brief video on best practices, class participants gathered in the parking lot of the old DMV building on Jean Street where they reviewed how to:

- Inspect a vehicle before using it.
- Hitch a trailer to a vehicle.
- Drive the vehicle and trailer through a course.
- Reverse the trailer into a defined area.
- Learn how to be a spotter who can help safely guide the driver through the test drive scenario.

IN THE WORKS



Road repaving (Ongoing): Almost 23 lane miles have been repaved this year, and currently crews are working in Fairway Estates. The last phase of the year, about six miles, will occur on beachside. The list of roads is being evaluated due to some FDOT work that may interfere with operations. Preliminarily, the roads being considered are:

- N. Oleander Ave. (Euclid to Seaview)
- Seaview Ave. (Halifax to A1A)
- N. Peninsula Dr. (Seaview to Zelda)
- Zelda Blvd. (Halifax to A1A)
- University Blvd. (Colin’s Park to A1A)
- Flower Dr. & Lantana Terrace (Chaffee to Halifax)
- Chaffee Place (Wilmans to University)



Utilities readies for summer rainfall (Ongoing): As the rainy season is upon us, Utility Department crews have been proactively removing debris from storm drains, catch basins and drainage outlets throughout the city. Last week, 23 yards of debris – litter, leaves and lawn clippings – was collected from more the 500 stormwater inlets throughout the city. In addition to cleaning the inlets, crews also pumped down the North Street and Butts Park ponds to create more capacity for rainwater. Dickerson Community Center & Campbell Aquatic Pool improvements almost complete

Join us for a grand reopening community event from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. **Saturday, Aug. 5**, to celebrate the completion of a three-year project to improve amenities and functionality at the Dickerson Community Center, 308 S. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. Blvd., and adjacent Campbell Aquatic Center. Improvements include new playground equipment, basketball court, additional parking, connecting sidewalks in the reconfigured space, improved exterior lighting, exterior paint and upgraded landscaping as well as new flooring in the gymnasium. In addition, a colorful mural was painted on the utility box.

The entrance to Campbell Aquatic Center was moved to the north side with a new pool entry pavilion, stairs and ADA compliant ramp to enter the area and two canopy shade structures were added over picnic tables.

The almost \$1.7 million project received about \$369,000 in grants from the Daytona Beach Racing and Recreational Facilities District. At the reopening celebration, residents can enjoy free swimming, games, music and refreshments.

READING Paws provides youth with a fun and interactive way to improve literacy skills through the assistance of nationally registered therapy animal-owner/handler teams. Once a book is chosen, children sit and read for 15 minutes to fine-tune their reading skills. These trained dogs are ideal reading companions because they:

- Help increase relaxation
- Listen attentively
- Do not judge, laugh or criticize
- Allow children to proceed at their own pace
- Are less intimidating than peers or adults

Celebrate July 4th in Daytona Beach

There will be a Fourth of July Veterans Parade, beginning at 10 a.m. **Tuesday, July 4**, on Main Street. The parade will pay tribute to veterans and first responders and is being organized by Volusia Veterans.



The parade will start on Main Street at Atlantic Avenue and travel west on Main Street to the base of the bridge.

In addition to the parade, there will be a special July 4th Veterans Ceremony beginning at 9 a.m. by the Clock Tower between the Boardwalk and the Hilton Daytona Beach Oceanfront Resort that will be presented by Volusia Veterans and is sponsored by the city.

An extended fireworks display over the Atlantic Ocean in Daytona Beach will start at about 9:45 p.m. Spectators can view the show from the boardwalk behind the Hilton Oceanfront Resort, on the beach or in Breakers Oceanfront Park. The pyrotechnic extravaganza follows a free concert at 7:15 p.m. by the Alter Eagles, an Eagles tribute band, at the Oceanfront Bandshell.
