

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## Mission Statement

### Office of Professional Standards

#### Purpose

The Office of Professional Standards (OPS) is charged with preserving the integrity of the Daytona Beach Police Department (DBPD). Organizationally, OPS is part of the Office of the Chief and serves at the discretion and authority of Chief Craig A. Capri.

#### Tasks

The detectives assigned to OPS carryout many functions that ensure DBPD operates as a professional and transparent law enforcement agency.

Per current Department directives, the Office of Professional Standards shall investigate and review all Level One complaints. Level One (1) complaints refer to complaints concerning allegations of but not limited to:

- Criminal conduct;
- Excessive force;
- Unlawful / Improper Arrest;
- Unlawful / Improper Entry;
- Unlawful / Improper Search;
- Any major wrongdoing on the part of an employee;
- Sexual Harassment;
- U.S. Code Title VII violations;
- U.S. Code Title II violations.

Some of the additional tasks completed by OPS include:

- Review and investigate allegations concerning employee misconduct
- Review department member involved traffic crashes
- Facilitate random drug screening for members of DBPD
- Assist in policy review
- Review all use of force applications
- Policy development
- Staff inspections and audits
- Fielding Public Records request

### **Summary**

A review of the 2018 annual statistics shows the following:

- Total investigations were up from 2017 (from 62 - 80, 29% increase)
- IA investigations were up from 2017 (from 11 -13, 18% increase)
- Citizens' Complaints were down from 2017 (from 15 -12, 20% decrease)
- Information cases were up from 2017 (from 34 - 54, 59% increase)
- Firearms Discharges were down from 2017 (from 2 - 1, 50% decrease)
- RTRs were down from 2017 (from 89 - 73, 18% decrease)
- Vehicle Pursuits were down from 2017 (from 10 - 7, 30% decrease)
- Vehicle Crashes were up from 2017 (from 54 - 60, 11% increase)
- Alert Reviews were up from 2017 (from 12 - 42, 250% increase)

### **2019 Outlook**

In 2019, The Office of Professional Standards has several staff inspections and audits scheduled.

- Complete vehicle staff inspections
- Complete records staff inspections
- Complete property and evidence staff inspections
- Complete armory staff inspections
- Complete Criminal Investigations Division cash audits (GIU/SIU)
- Complete locker inspections
- Complete AXON body camera audit

In 2019, the Office of Professional Standards will seek and research ways to proactively reduce internal and external complaints by bringing awareness to officers' actions that would generate complaints.
